Smart PLS Algorithm Model

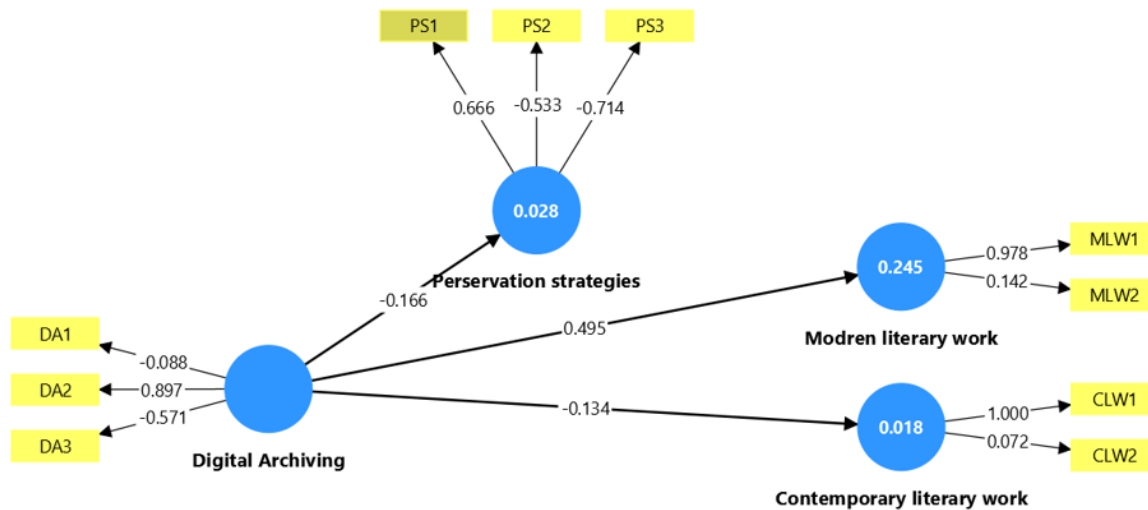


Figure 1: SmartPLS Path Analysis Structural Equation Model for Digital Archiving and Literary Work.
